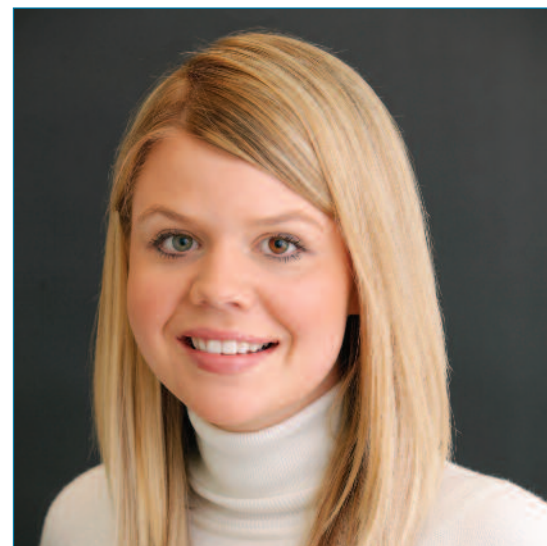

Joseph E. Stiglitz

Senior Fellow
Chief Economist

Stiglitz is a Senior Fellow and Chief Economist at the Roosevelt Institute and a University Professor at Columbia University, where he chairs the Committee on Global Thought and founded the Initiative for Policy Dialogue. In 2001, he won the Nobel Prize in economics for his analyses of markets with asymmetric information, and he was a lead author of the 1995 Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, which shared the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize. He served as chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers under President Clinton and as chief economist and senior vice president of the World Bank from 1997 to 2000. He helped create a new branch of economics, the economics of information, and has written or co-authored several books including *Globalization and Its Discontents* (Norton, W.W. & Co., 2003), which has been translated into 35 languages.
